Discussion: Elaine Herbert relinquished the role of Chair to Ursula Katic so she could speak to this item.

Last year, Education Council approved a two-year calendar that included an alternative reading week schedule with two extended long-weekends: one in November and one in February. Feedback from students and faculty on the revised schedule is that the weeklong Reading Break in February is preferred.

Education Council reviewed the two draft schedules presented at the February 2016 EdCo meeting and preferred the DRAFT 2017/2018 Schedule of Events with Sept 5 Start noted with Reading Week scheduled from February 13 – February 16, 2018. (ATTACHED)

Ursula Katic gave back the role of chair to Elaine Herbert.

Ken Tourand commented that an additional change is the campus closure for National Aboriginal Day on June 21.

Ursula Katic noted that Indigenous Veterans Day, which is commemorated annually on November 8<sup>th</sup>, is also worth considering.

## B. 3 Revised General Admission Policy (ATTACHED)

Motion 7: To accept the amendment to the General Admissions Policy for underage students.

Discussion: John Chenoweth presented a revision to the current General Admission Policy, which includes language on admitting underage students. John explained that by admitting underage students (who are still considered children), NVIT assumes responsibility as well as liability for the students. The policy requires underage students to be tied to a school district and have permission from a parent or guardian before they can enrol in classes at NVIT. It is important to note that admission requirements to NVIT do not defeat NVIT program requirements.

#### Part C Other

#### C. 1 Bridging to Technology

John Chenoweth advised that the First Nations Tech Council approached NVIT to talk about programing that would create career opportunities in technology for Aboriginal people. The program would operate similar to Bridging to Trades in that it would introduce students to a variety of areas in technology. NVIT will be working with the First Nations Tech Council over the next four years in hopes of delivering 25 intakes of the program throughout the province. Courses will be developed and presented at SPAC and EdCo when ready.

Anna Brown commented that because the courses are pre-college courses, students will not be eligible for funding for living allowance or band sponsorship. John noted that NVIT will be responsible for the delivery and the First Nations Tech Council will be looking into student supports.

## C. 2 School Appeal Process

Elaine Herbert relinquished the role of Chair to Ursula Katic so she could speak to this item.

Elaine has participated on a couple of student appeal committees recently and is concerned about some gaps in NVIT's appeal policy.

Ken Tourand acknowledged Elaine's concerns and confirmed that NVIT has met with an external policy writer and that NVIT's Student Appeals Policy is a top priority.

Department Heads will be involved in the review and development of policies pertaining to academics.

Ursula Katic gave back the role of chair to Elaine Herbert.

## Scheduling Principles

Revised January 26, 2016

#### Introduction

The Academic Schedule will normally be presented to Education Council by the Registrar and will be published in the calendar. Following are the principles used in developing the Academic Schedule.

## A. Term Dates

- 1. The **Fall Term** normally begins the day after the Labour Day statutory holiday in September and continues for fourteen (14) instructional weeks followed by a one week exam period.
- 2. The **Spring Term** normally begins the day after the New Year's Day statutory holiday in January and is comprised of fourteen (14) instructional weeks, a four day "Reading Break" following the BC Family Day holiday and a one (1) week exam period.
- 3. The **Summer Term** normally begins the first full week of May and continues for fourteen (14) instructional weeks followed by a one (1) week exam period.
- 4. Courses offered off-stream (e.g. later start, earlier finish, condensed offerings, or sections that span more than one term etc.) must be scheduled to include Education Council approved student contact hours.

## B. Add/Drop and Withdrawal Dates

- 1. The last day to add or drop classes (Add/Drop date) is calculated based upon 13% of the total duration of the course delivery.
- 2. Withdrawal/Change to Audit dates are established according to Board Policy (C.3.6 Course Withdrawal):
  - "... up to 66% of the duration of the course delivery. For courses delivered over more than a two-week period, this will be calculated up to the end of the week. Courses delivered in a module format (two weeks or less) will be calculated to the end of the 66% duration day."
- 3. Withdrawal dates for "off-stream" (see 4 above) courses will be calculated by the Registrar, recorded in Colleague and published in section information.

## C. Examination Periods


- 1. Examination periods for each term will begin the day following the final day of classes for the term and will normally be seven (7) calendar days in duration.
- 2. In accordance with Board Policy (C:1.9 Final Examinations), the Examination Schedule will be finalized by the Registrar eight (8) weeks before the last day of classes.

## D. Statutory Holidays

- 1. Statutory holidays will follow provincial standards and will be considered in building Term schedules. Where statutory holidays will adversely affect scheduled class time, Departments will make alternate arrangements to ensure student contact hours are met.
- 2. In the event a statutory holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, campuses will be closed the following Monday.
- 3. No classes will be scheduled on June 21st in observation of National Aboriginal Day.

#### E. Elections

 The voting process for Education Council and Board of Governors will commence within 72 hours after the stable enrolment date.

# Admissions/Registration/Fees

## **C.3.3 General Admission Requirements**

Approved/revised: March 29, 2017

**POLICY** 

## **General Admission Statement:**

Eligibility for admission is based on citizenship, age, English language and academic requirements. Specific program admission requirements or course prerequisites must be met in addition to any general admission requirements. In cases where applicants may not meet the specific admission requirements for a desired program or course, NVIT offers programming which may lead to the qualifications necessary for specific program entry.

#### General admission

In all cases, specific program admission requirements or course prerequisites take precedence over general admission requirements and should be checked at the time of application. Although some programs and/or courses at NVIT do not require Grade 12 or equivalent, the following qualifications are generally accepted where Grade 12 or equivalent is listed as a requirement for admission:

- a) Students who have graduated from a BC secondary school;
- b) Students who have a BC Adult Graduation Diploma;
- c) Students who have completed the GED meet the general admission requirements for Grade 12 or equivalent, but are also required to complete an assessment and are subject to specific program and/or course requirements;
- d) Mature Students who have not graduated from a BC secondary school may be admitted to the College Readiness program, or desired program, upon completion of an assessment indicative of required English and Math requirements.

## Citizenship and immigration requirements

NVIT accepts applications for admission from prospective students only if they

- a) Are citizens of Canada; or
- b) Hold status granted by Employment and Immigration Canada as Permanent Residents (landed immigrants), proof of which must be submitted; or
- c) Hold a valid study permit issued by Immigration Canada, proof of which must be submitted. Students applying under this section are specifically referred to the sections of this calendar dealing with International Students and International Student Fees.

## English Language Requirement

To create the best possible learning environment at NVIT it is critical that all students be able to participate in classroom activities and complete written assignments. English is the language of instruction and communication at NVIT. Therefore, all applicants must demonstrate fluency in English by fulfilling one of the following options:

- 1. Two years of full-time study at grade 8 or higher level with English as the language of instruction. Studies that are part of an English as a Second Language program cannot be used toward fulfilling this option; or
- 2. Successful completion of BC English 11 (or equivalent acceptable to NVIT) with a minimum grade of C+; or

- 3. Successful completion of a university transferable post-secondary level English course with a minimum grade of C; or
- 4. A minimum score of 213 on the computer-based TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) test with a minimum essay score of 4.0; or
- 5. A minimum score of 550 on the paper-based TOEFL test and a minimum TWE (Test of Written English) score of 4.0; or
- 6. A minimum score of 4 on the LPI (Language Proficiency Index) within the past 2 years; or
- 7. A minimum score of 6.0 on each of the academic listening, reading, writing, and speaking modules of the IELTS (International English Language Testing System) exam.

#### Mature Status

For admission purposes, a mature student is one who is 19 years of age or older, and who has been out of school for at least one year. Adults are encouraged to apply to specific programs even if they are unable to meet specified educational requirements since other factors such as maturity and work experience may be considered in some programs. If students do not meet minimum educational requirements for a desired program, they may demonstrate these requirements through an assessment and/or upgrade by completing appropriate program admission requirements and course pre-requisites.

## **Under Age Students**

Underage Students who are less than 19 years of age prior to the first day of classes may be granted special admission to a program upon the written recommendation of the appropriate Dean, or designate, of the specific program. The Nicola Valley Institute of Technology reserves the right to determine whether to permit an under-aged student to register. Students must have written consent of the parent or legal guardian. These students will fall under one of three categories:

- 1. Students generally have an outstanding academic record and will complete Grade 11 in the year that they are applying for admission. They also require the authorization of the appropriate secondary school principal and receive early entry admission status; or
- 2. Students have completed grade 12 in the year in which they are applying for admission; or
- 3. Students have enrolled in a program under an agreement with the local School District such as ACE-IT or a Dual Credit Agreement.
